



Presenter Biographies

Serena Ard was born and raised in the Calumet Region but never knew much of its history until becoming the curator of the Westchester Township History Museum in 2011. She received her B.A. from Concordia University in Austin, Texas, and taught for 8 years before attending graduate school at the University of North Carolina Greensboro. After earning her M.A. in history, she moved back to The Region and began working at the museum. Now she can't get enough of this area's history. She is fascinated by people's stories and feels that a local history museum should represent those stories as accurately and as broadly as possible. Her friends and family would say she is incredibly nosey, but it's really just intellectual curiosity.

Mark Bouman is a member of the board of directors of the Calumet Heritage Partnership. His association with the Calumet Heritage Partnership dates to the opening presentation he gave at the first Calumet Heritage Conference in 1999, although it was not until 2005 that he joined the board when CHP became formally affiliated with Chicago's Steel Heritage Project. Between 2007 and 2017, he served as CHP's President. Mark has been closely involved with several Calumet regional efforts, including the Lake Calumet Ecosystem Partnership, Calumet Stewardship Initiative, and the Calumet Environmental Resource Center at Chicago State University. He was the Project Director for a widely distributed map of the Calumet region that originally appeared in the Spring, 2009 issue of Chicago Wilderness magazine. Mark's association with the Calumet region dates to his undergraduate days at Valparaiso University, where the classic geomorphology field trip from the Kankakee Sand Islands, across the Valparaiso Moraine, and to the lakefront at Mt. Baldy set the hook for a professional lifetime in geography, and, as it turns out, the Calumet region. Mark's graduate work in geography at the University of Minnesota focused on the relationship between cities and technology, and his work in that area has appeared in the Journal of Urban History, the Journal of American History, and The Cities and Technology Reader. He was a Professor of Geography at Chicago State University from 1984 to 2012. Since 2012, he is the Chicago Region Program Director in the Division of Environment, Culture, and Conservation at The Field Museum.

Kevin Brown is the Illinois Vice President of the Calumet Heritage Partnership (CHP). He is a lifelong resident of the Calumet Region, both in Illinois & Northwest Indiana, and co-owns a marketing & communications firm with his wife Sara. In his hometown of Blue Island, Illinois, he serves as Executive Director of the Blue Island Historical Society, Chairman of the Blue Island Arts Alliance, and Secretary of Blue Island's Historic Preservation Commission. He and his wife also produce an award-winning documentary series on Blue Island -- My B.I. -- a video portrait of the people, places, and stories that make their city so special.

Samuel Love is the editor of *The Gary Anthology* (Belt, 2020). He is a social and civic practice artist who organizes public projects that connect communities to their cultural and ecological histories through publishing, multi-media installations, and performance. Past engagements include the Gary Poetry Project (2017), the Gary Nature Project (2018), the Lockport Poetry Project (2018), and the Carroll County Poetry Project (2019/20). He was a 2019/20 Indiana Arts Commission on Ramp fellow and Individual Advancement Program grant recipient.

Kym Mazelle was born and raised in Gary, Indiana and is regarded as one of the pioneers of House Music. Credited as "The First Lady of House Music," she is a graduate of Columbia College Chicago. She helped shape and pioneer House Music after starting a small label, House To House Records, with two partners and releasing her first single, "Taste My Love." This single, part of the Chicago House Music explosion, was exported to London via various DJs. This new form of music contributed to the birth and growth of Rave, Dance, Club Culture, Pirate Radio and the birth of the Celebrity DJ across Europe and the UK. Kym was relocated to the UK by her record label EMI Worldwide in the early 90's to begin a life's adventure. To date, Kym has graced the stage and worked with such luminaries as: Sir Mick Jagger, Chaka Khan, Baz Lurhman, Grace Jones, Naomi Campbell, Frankie Knuckles, Pete Tong OBE, JazzieB OBE, Maceo Parker, Soul2Soul, David Guetta, Simon Cowell, Jocelyn Brown, and many more. Kym has also appeared on countless BBC and ITV television shows. Her musical theatre credits include the West End production of "Thriller Live" and a tour production of Ray Charles' "I Can't Stop Loving You" and "Smokey Joe's Café". She also leads workshops on education and public speaking at universities and high schools in the USA and the UK. She splits her time between London and Gary, Indiana.
